

IN MEMORIAM

Following the home-call of Rev Bill Lynwode on 29th September 2018 (see TOGETHER No 34), Mary Lynwode was called home following a short illness on 28th October. The funeral service for Bill had been postponed and a Service of Thanksgiving for both Mary and Bill was held at the Wollaston Baptist Church on 22nd November.



Like Bill, Mary Rimmer came from Southport. At age 16 she became a cadet nurse and at age 18 began her nurses training qualifying 3 years later and being awarded the gold medal for her studies. Bill and Mary had met at their local Methodist Church and they were married 28th March 1959. After having her family - 3 daughters and one son - Mary returned to nursing, working as a nurse in the Southport maternity unit and when the Lynwodes entered the Nazarene ministry and moved to Watford, Mary trained and qualified as a Registered Midwife at Watford General Hospital. Mary continued her work as a midwife during the Croydon pastorate until her retirement.

Mary was a great support and help to her husband's ministry over the years, helping with the Caravanners, teaching Sunday School, and being a source of advice and reassurance to new Mums. Mary Lynwode had a gift of knowing when people were hurting and in need of a listening ear.

Rev Erica Tuxworth (Watford) participated in the funeral service and a number of Nazarene clergy and spouses were present to represent the Church of the Nazarene and to support the Lynwode family at their time of loss.



Rev Ernest Arthur David Eades, pastor and missionary, was called home 21st November, aged 99. Originally from London, where the family attended the International Holiness Mission in Battersea, Ernest Eades responded the call to full-time ministry and trained at Emmanuel Bible College, Birkenhead, where he met Jessie Munn from Belfast. Ernest and Jessie were married 16th December 1942, and following pastoral and evangelistic work in the UK, Ernest was ordained in 1946, and

they were blessed with a daughter when Margaret-Anne was born. The Eades were appointed missionaries to the Cape Verde Islands and after a year's language study in Portugal began a 22-year ministry of church planting and kingdom building in the Cape Verde. Returning to the UK in 1969, Jessie was diagnosed with cancer and a return to the mission field was not possible. During these years Ernest ministered in several Nazarene churches in Ulster and was instrumental in planting the Desertmartin Church. Jessie was called home in May 1974 aged 55. The Desertmartin Church was named the "Jessie Eades Memorial Church of the Nazarene" in her memory and Jessie was interred in the small cemetery adjacent to the church.

In 1976 Ernest married Catherine (Kay) Lewis who was a member of the Skegoneill Avenue Church, and a new chapter of ministry began. For some 30 years Ernest and Kay ministered in churches in Belfast, Keighley, London, and for 7 years as missionaries in the Azores. Moving to Carrickfergus in 1995, Ernest, at age 75, had no thought of retiring and for a few years gave pastoral oversight to the Greenisland church. In 1998 the Carrickfergus church honoured Ernest by conferring on him the title 'Senior Pastor' and the Eades threw in their lot with the Carrickfergus church, bringing new life to prayer meetings, and supporting the work and programme of the church. Kay was called home in December 2015, aged 75, and in 2017 Ernest, aged 97, took up residence in a local nursing home where on 27th October 2018 he celebrated his 99th birthday.

A Service of Thanksgiving for the life and ministry of Rev E.A.D. Eades was held on Sunday afternoon, 25th November in the Desertmartin church followed by interment in the church cemetery. Margaret-Anne, Ernest's daughter, who lives abroad, was able to be present at this service. The service was conducted by Rev Philip McAlister who also led the Memorial Service held Saturday, 8th December in the Carrickfergus Church. Others who took part in the Memorial Service included, Rev John Paton, Rev Colin H. Wood, and Ivan Crowe who brought a personal tribute having, over the past few years, exercised a ministry of care and support for Rev Eades. We thank God for the long life of ministry and faithful service of Rev Eades.

Pastor John Craig reports: "In the Summer of 2017, Parkhead Nazarene purchased the old Charter pub - located on Tollcross Road about half a mile from Parkhead - around the time when the church had been considering the idea of church-planting. A team of dedicated people set to work on this new project, both considering the strategy side of things, as well as refurbishing the property to make it fresh and functional. Using the help of various volunteers and trades people, we completed an overhaul of the old pub completed an overhaul of the old pub facilities to create a flexible meeting area,

group of approximately 20 from the Parkhead congregation have committed themselves to be a part of this new work and the property is now called "The 'New' Charter"

"In December 2018, we opened our doors for a month of pilot activities and 'welcome events' in the run up to Christmas. Since the New Year, we have opened officially with a weekly programme of events as well as a Sunday worship gathering. Already, there is a sense that God is ahead of us in this exciting new ministry, with many opportunities to serve the local community and explore faith with those we get to meet!





ARCHBISHOP'S VISIT

The Gillingham Salem Church of the Nazarene has been running a Winter Night Shelter for homeless people for the past 3 years, with great success. It is run as an ecumenical project with volunteers from other churches in Medway helping out with from other churches in Medway helping out with cooking and serving an evening meal, sleeping overnight and serving breakfasts.
