IRISTMAS IN TROUBLESOME TIMES

There is one particular Christmas of my childhood that comes to mind every year. I must have been 12 or 13 years-old that year of multiple Christmases. Going 'home' for Christmas, for my family, meant a 400-mile journey on pre-motorway roads. So, we would have our family celebration the night before, and pile the seven of us plus gifts into the car, and head to the grandparents. My memory tells me we drove through snow most the way; but the reward was a week-long snow-time, and the gathering of both parents' clans. But, what stands out in my mind is sitting alone in a darkened family room, just before the trip, with only the lights of the present laden tree glowing, with feelings of great warmth and anticipation. That moment is my

definition of the feelings of 'Christmas spirit'.

Now the 'run-up' to Christmas starts earlier every year, it seems. Store decorations can be seen by September. Most of us probably wouldn't notice if it were not for the 'Christmas Watch' brigade who informs us, with disgust, of these early sightings. Then begins the raging debate on social media about when it is acceptable to start playing Christmas music. This, like so much of today's public life, is polarized between those who will not allow it before the First of December and those who proudly begin the music in October. Whatever the case may be, however, it must be Christmas when the department store Christmas adverts come out!

At whatever point the preparations are allowed to begin, the goal seems to be to invoke those warm and comforting feelings of cosy fire-side Christmas spirit. In troubled times such as ours the temptation to escape into this comfort-zone is great. It is likely that many who have read this far will be saying to yourselves, 'Where will such cosy feelings come from for me? Where is the comfort-zone?' Good feelings are hard to come by in these times.

But at this season of the Christian year it is precisely the troubled feelings of the first Christmas that we need to remember. It was a time of political upheaval, military occupation, and economic hardship when Joseph and Mary made their journey to Bethlehem. Joseph was coming to terms with the pregnancy of his fiancée; Mary with unexpected pregnancy. The journey would result in a flight to a foreign country for refuge from persecution. And, while there may not have been deep snow, the circumstances were far from comfortable.

We recall these feelings, and mark them as our call to prayer for those in our cities and land and in so many hurting countries around our troubled earth, facing all these hardships and more. Recall; pray; but do not despair.

Let us feel the sorrows deeply, yes—while we also hear again that which was proclaimed by angels as 'good news'. Into the depths of darkness and despondency God's action in Jesus is the announcement of 'peace on earth', and 'great joy for everyone', because 'God is with us'. Indeed, 'nothing is impossible with God'.

Whatever the politicians may say about the days ahead, for good or for ill, the word from the Father of Jesus Christ is Hope.

REGIONAL CONFERENCE

ver 500 from nearly 40 countries attended the "Invisible World" Regional Conference held 15th-18th November in Kyrenia, Cyprus. Countries represented included the UK (approx. 50 attended from the UK), Ireland, Norway and Denmark to the West and Russia, Kazakhstan, and Serbia to the East - and many places in between (and also India and Bangladesh). Simultaneous translation was provided in Arabic, French, Portuguese, Bulgarian, Romanian and Russian and main speakers included pastors from Hungary and Nepal. Also taking part were Dr David Graves (General Superintendent - who will be with us in 2020 at our District Assemblies) and Dr Verne Ward (Global Missions Director). Musicians from across the region led in the worship sessions, and workshops and seminars were held dealing with a broad range of topics. Everyone was assigned to a 'Family Group' numbering about 8 people for fellowship, sharing and prayer. The Eastern part of the Region will hold its conference 25th-29th January 2020 in Hyderabad, India. 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
GRADUATION

An estimated crowd of nearly 500 attended this year's graduation ceremony held 5th October in The Whitworth Hall of the University of Manchester. A total of 52 graduates were listed which included 5 PhD's, 19 MA's (which is probably the largest group of MA graduates in the history of the College), and 21 BA's. There were also a number of diplomas and certificates awarded. The graduation speaker, Dr Carla Sunberg, is a graduate of NTC and one of the 6 General Superintendents in the Church of the Nazarene. Special recognition and honour was given to Dr Kent Brower who has served the college over the past five-plus decades as Lecturer, Bursar, Academic Dean, Senior Research Fellow, and Vice-Principal. Dr Brower now holds the title of Director of Research. Dr Peter Rae adds the title of Vice-Principal to his existing role of

GLOBAL CONFERENCE

NTC-Manchester participation was in evidence at the meetings of the American Academy of

Religion and Society of Biblical Literature held 23rd-26th November at the San Diego Convention Centre, California, USA. This is the world's largest gathering of scholars interested in the study of religion with more that 1000 events taking place and with an attendance of some 10,000 scholars. Dr T.A Noble (NTC & NTS) chaired a group session devoted to the theology of T.F.Torrance who was Dr Noble's professor at Edinburgh University, Dr Jacob Lett, who recently completed his doctoral studies under Dr Noble at NTC-Manchester, and is now on the faculty of MidAmerica Nazarene University, read a paper in one of the sessions, and Dr Geordan Hammond chaired several sessions organised by the Manchester Wesley Research Centre based at NTC-Manchester.

Originally from the East End of Glasgow, Brodie's first career was in construction as a quantity surveyor. After deciding to study Theology he completed a BA in theology and then served as a youth pastor in his local Baptist church on the South Side of Glasgow where he continues to worship and is a member of the Senior Leadership Team.

DR WES WHITE grew up as a missionary kid in what is now the Democratic Republic of the Congo where his parents were medical missionaries. He holds a number of degrees including a DMin, and a PhD from the University of Notre Dame in Indiana, USA. After serving as a pastor for 15 years he and his family came to Glasgow to be a part of a church plant. Wes now leads a ministry among refugees and asylum seekers called Upper Room Church. Wes is part of the teaching team for Forge Scotland, at NTC-GLC he teaches Biblical Studies and is the course leader for the MA Theology (Urban Studies) heading up Neopolis - the Scottish Centre for Theology and Ministry in an Urban World.

PAM MELLSTROM serves NTC-GLC as Placement Manager working closely with students on placement throughout the central belt of Scotland and with their placement provider. Pam has BA degrees in Educational Studies and in Informal and

Community Education, a SQA (Scottish Qualifications Authority) in Supervision Studies, and a post graduate certificate in Urban Mission from NTC. For 15 years Pam was involved in community work based at Linlithgow Young People's Project and has held youth work roles in St Michael's Church of Scotland in Linlithgow. 80 YEARS IN GILLINGHAM

It was in February 1939 that local businessman and his wife, Mr & Mrs Hales, invited Rev Maynard G. James to lead a campaign in Arden Street, Gillingham. In September 1939 the Calvary Holiness Church was established taking over a Methodist Church on Nelson Road, in which the church has met to the present day. Some 17 pastors have served the church over the years - Rev James M Bell served the longest (1959-1972) and the current pastor is Rev Dennis Braham who has been pastor for the past 5 years.





The 80th Anniversary programme included a Saturday evening banquet at which greetings were brought from Rehman Chishti MP and Rev Carl McCann (DS). (Rev McCann was the preacher on the Sunday).

The programme of the church includes two Sunday services, two mid-week Bible Studies, two weekly coffee mornings, a weekly drop-in serving meals to homeless and vulnerable people, and a night-shelter running from January to March. The church is also home to an African fellowship and a Chinese Church. We thank God for all who have served the Gillingham church over the years - "and the end is not yet!" SHANKILL ANNIVERSARY

Over the years the Shankill church has been involved in many areas of outreach, and

today there is a focus on praying for the community - with a Community Prayer Text Line, and a Community Prayer Hub. We thank God for the leadership and ministry of the Church over the years and for the ongoing work of the church.
