Advent Meditation - "The Coming One"

Christmas is the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ. It is the good news of the arrival of God's kingdom in the world. But why is Jesus the beginning of the good news? How can we be sure of it and is this still good news for us today?

One simple answer is that this is part of our history: 'As it is written,' Mark says. There is no need to imagine or to deny it. We have a cloud of witnesses who alerted us to expect this. 'The LORD will give what is good' (Ps 85:12) and 'Prepare the way of the LORD' for he comes with might (Isa 40:3,10). John the Baptist, the messenger, appears from the wilderness to testify about this powerful Messiah, the Son of God, who is about to baptise his people with the Holy Spirit and to reveal God's sacrificial love for humanity. The rest of the New Testament helps us understand how Jesus' ministry is God's perfect and hopeful plan for humanity, how he transforms people, unites and gives them hope, how those people themselves become carriers of the good news of God's great plan for the world.

But knowing the testimonies of others is not enough. The good news can be ours when we are a part of it just as Mark, John the Baptist, Peter, Paul and others before us. The good news is meant to make us truly open-minded viewing our lives against the canvas of God's eternal plan for his creation. It remains relevant if we continue asking ourselves, 'What is our place as individuals and communities in God's big picture?'

Do you remember the good old days? ...back in 2019 when you could call in on a friend for a cup of tea! How life can change so quickly. All of us have experienced restrictions, some illness, others bereavement. People have endured both mourning and celebrating in restricted environments, without the benefit of the human touch. It's been a strange year, to say the least, and one that I think we all hope will not be repeated.

Whilst I don't believe 'God sent Covid', I do believe that God can work through every circumstance, including 2020. Therefore, what have we learnt over the past 12 months?

As life (hopefully) returns to normal, what new things have emerged as a result of 2020, that we need to maintain? What things have disappeared, and need to remain that way? Let us all, personally, as married couples, families, communities and churches, take time to intentionally invite the Holy Spirit to truly speak into our lives, to continually mould and shape us in the image of Christ.

A COVID EXPERIENCE

- Rev Geoff Austin - retired Nazarene minister



I began to feel unwell on Sunday 13th September, the following Wednesday I had a COVID-19 test at Prestwick Airport and the next day I received the result - positive! I was immediately admitted to the ICU at Crosshouse Hospital, Kilmarnock - and I don't remember much after that for about four weeks.

My wife, Jane, received a phone call to say that I was going to be put on a ventilator. This caused the family to fear the worst, but they were trusting God whatever the outcome. Over the next few weeks literally thousands of people around the world were praying for me and the family, including the local RC priest who prayed for me in his services.

I was on the ventilator for 24 days. Apparently, I was quite delirious much of the time, but thankfully I don`t remember. I also had a tracheoscopy to help with breathing.

I received wonderful care in ICU. Jane and the family were able to phone at any time for updates and were encouraged when the doctor called and said he was "cautiously optimistic" about my condition. The nursing staff took videos which they sent to the family at various stages of my recovery. I have seen the videos but I don't recognise myself with all the tubes I had - and no beard! Our daughters, Jaime and Jo-Anne, kept a diary/video blog of my journey which has filled me in with lots of details that I had been unaware of. The nursing staff kept on telling me that I was doing really well and after about four weeks I was moved from ICU to a regular ward.

There were times when I felt low, especially during sleepless nights, when I felt like the Psalmist that I was in the "lowest pit, in the darkest depths' (Ps 88:6) and didn't know where I was or what was happening. But my improvement continued and the staff were amazed at what I could do. The next stage was to get home. The hospital arranged a home care package and I was able to get home after seven weeks on Wednesday 28th October. An Intermediate Care Team (ICT) now look after me,

I am now getting involved in the "InS:PIRE" (Intensive Care Syndrome Promoting Independence and Return to Employment) programme in which those who have suffered from COVID-19 meet on line to exchange experiences and try to encourage and learn from one another.

The family has been very supportive. Jane has been giving me injections, organising my medication, and generally being a great support. Jo-Anne, because she lives close by, has been able to give Jane and me practical help by shopping and visiting.

I said, when I first got home, that when I consider how many people have died from COVID-19 I wonder why I should have survived. I don't really have an answer but I do thank God for the extra time that I now have with family and friends - each day is precious. Also, I don't want to underestimate the power of the prayers of God's people. To God be the glory!

Lord, break this pandemic that holds us in fear Give thine assurance your presence is near Hear those who are afflicted as on thee they call Send forth your healing thou Master of All.



NTC GRADUATION 2020 saw a celebration located not in the usual imposing setting of the Whitworth Hall, but as an online celebration, with Graduands connecting in from across the world. Usually, up to 600 people gather to celebrate those who graduate - but this year, over 4000 people have watched the online celebrations. The 57 graduates joined the event from all around the world - from all over the UK, from Kenya, from Malaysia, from the US and Canada, from Germany, South Africa, Croatia, Pakistan, Jordan, South Korea. One PhD graduate in Hawaii got up at 3:00 am with his family to celebrate, and it was lovely to see students sending their pictures of celebration - from their kitchens and living rooms, from their back gardens - two were outside Buckingham Palace, wearing pink mortar boards!

Our nine PhD graduates included those from Kenya (Zimbabwe), Benin, Malaysia - to continue a remarkable investment by NTC in the global church. Revd Dr Klaus Arnold, newly-appointed Global Commissioner of Education in the Church of the Nazarene, and himself an NTC PhD graduate, brought the Graduation address. 2020 DIDSBURY LECTURES: Professor John Swinton, Chair in Divinity and Religious Studies at the University of Aberdeen, brought this year's Didsbury Lectures, with the title 'Empire of Illusion: What do we Do about the Problem of Evil.' The lectures were delivered by ZOOM, which enabled engagement from around the world - and the lectures engendered a lively debate and discussion. Next year's lectures will be brought by Professor John M G Barclay (Lightfoot Professor of Divinity, Durham University).

NEW STUDENTS: The College has welcomed over fifty new students this year - a real cause for celebration, given the restrictions on recruitment from some traditional sources through the pandemic period. Although all classes are being delivered by videoconference, there are new students in residence (in social-distancing households), and, where allowed, meeting in face-to-face settings to nurture community. REV HUGH HANNA GORMAN passed away in Calgary, Canada, 18th May 2020, age 88.
