Holy Spirit Encounters (1)

Joel 2:28-32 Acts 2:1-14a Acts 2:41-47

Sermon Notes for 23 May 2021

A few years ago I was in holiday, I was in Spain. And I had an encounter with a local waiter at a restaurant who was having trouble with my English - well, maybe not so much my English but my Glaswegian accent. And as he struggled to take my order of cheeseburger and chips after 3 attempt I did what many of us do in that situation thinking it would help but it really doesn't - I started to shout louder! Eventually Debbie stepped in and pointed to the menu. I wonder how you are all doing with my Glaswegian accent? Believe it or not this is it toned all the way down!

We have mentioned before about the benefit of taking a step back and seeing the big picture of the Scriptures as a way of shedding new light on the truths of these incredible stories, haven't we? Pentecost is a stunning story in and of itself - God's power and presence is now available to everyone, everywhere - but there are clues in the grand narrative of the Bible that point us to to what else is happening here.

And one of our first clues to the truth of Pentecost is to be found way back in Genesis chapter 11 where you find a peculiar story of the people of the earth, who at that time had one language and common speech - no Glaswegian to be found! And with that, the people, we are told, build a tower to reach heaven in order that they might make a name for themselves - remember that! And this strange but selfish action has consequences. As a result of this, God scatters them and they are no longer one in language or common in speech. Their selfish actions resulted in division.

But here, in today's passage, the Pentecost narrative we find that one of the implications of God's spirit is this ability to communicate in such a way that all can understand, all can respond, all can be invited. And this, it seems, reverses the consequences of Babel. Selfishness results in division, seeking God and receiving his Spirit resulting in inclusion, invitation, communication of a message, the Gospel, which is a message that brings life and peace and community.

And the fruit of all of that is this new community, the Church. The was born on that day - today is our birthday! The Spirit of God gives birth to the Church and the church is the vehicle for God's message of the Gospel to be carried outward and forward. Outward as it reaches those around us and continues to move outward but also forward as it is passed from generation to generation and as a result exists today, over two thousand years later! What a joy it is to be part of God's church!

But it is good for us take this annual reminder of our roots and the way in which the Spirit empowered the church back then and also empowers us today to continue this beautiful legacy. And the reason it's good is that if we are not careful we can sometimes make the mistake of those who sought to build the tower of Babel. Let's make for our selves a place of safety, a place of comfort, a place of security. And what we end up with is something which Lucy reminded me this week is what Tony Compolo described as 'country club church.' Where we sing our favourite songs, and sit in our favourite seats, next to our favourite people week in week out and think to ourselves, 'this is nice.' And it is nice, but it isn't the church.

Do you know what makes the church unique? What makes the church unique is that it is one of the very few movements that exist entirely for the benefit of those who are not yet a part of it. And the church is at it's best when it is Spirit empowered and seeking to exist purely for those who are not yet a part of it.

And so when you look back through the history of the church (the global church, that is) here's what you will see. I'll be really honest with you - you'll see some really ugly truths in there. There are times when the church has made some really bad mistakes - supporting war, corruption, abuse... it's hard to look at sometimes. But here is what else you'll see. You'll see a history where the church has lived into the truth of Gospel, that Jesus offers life, and in the power of the Spirit has built and run hospitals and schools and fed the hungry and clothed the naked and welcomed the stranger and the immigrant. All of this, I hope you can see is the work of Jesus continuing to serve the world through His church which is filled and led by the Holy Spirit.

The day of Pentecost presents us with a choice. A choice of two towers, if you like. The first is a tower built on selfishness and pride and seeks security and comfort and results only in division. The second is not so much a tower that reaches to heaven but instead a structure that is built because heaven has reached down and for those who respond to this invitation of grace and mercy and love all embodied in a saviour called Jesus we get to be a part of something that isn't necessarily tall but is as wide as the whole earth as God's love and power goes out from it.

That's what we celebrate today, the church! The church us how God has brought the message of Grace into our lives and that's how we continue to participate in his grace; by being a part of the community which offers that same grace to everyone around us.
