

We continue to remember the situation in India, and other countries that are struggling to overcome the devastating effects of the Coronavirus.


The prayer needs of the church are much as they were last week.

Holy Spirit Encounters (4) Acts 10: 23-48 Pastor Mick Kane

I wonder if you can remember where you were on the day of some significant events. You know the ones I'm talking about. Events that when you become aware of them you understand that things will never be the same again afterwards. Events like 9/11 or the coming down of the Berlin Wall. Or when the UK Prime Minister gave the announcement for the first time that we were to stay indoors. Or when Scotland goalkeeper, David Marshall, saved the final penalty in a shootout against Serbia that secured Scotland's place at their first major national football tournament in 23 years!

Okay, maybe not so much that last one but you know the events I mean, right? Events that change the course of human history. Well, our passage today is one such event. Do you realise that? A major turning point not only in the Scriptural narrative but, I would argue, in human history. The day where it became clear that God's gift of salvation, and indeed the gift of his very self in the form of the Holy Spirit is no longer confined to one particular people group in one particular place. Because of the events of this passage we understand that God has made himself and his gift of salvation available to all people, everywhere! One commentator calls the events of this passage a game changer!

And it is a huge change. God's presence and saving power, which had up until this point it seems, in the eyes of many people at least, been reserved for the Israelite people of God - the Jews. And now, through a sequence of dreams, direct revelation from God and an encounter with Holy Spirit, it is clear that things have changed. The Gentiles (a biblical word for non-Jews) are now to be included in the Covenant community of God. Wow!

But let's reflect on this for a second - what exactly has changed? Has God changed his mind all of a sudden? We know this causes problems for us as we believe that we worship an unchangeable God. So I don't think God changed here. I think what is more likely is that people's understanding of who God is changed. I believe that what God has done here is shown us this: God is and al-

ways has been at work in all the world (and by the world I mean outside of the people of God), and what we need to do is open our eyes to see it more and have a willingness to join him in that work.

Peter had his eyes opened. Cornelius had his eyes opened. All the people who witnessed first hand these non Jewish people receiving the Holy Spirit and displaying the gifts of such also had their eyes opened to the fact that God can and does operate outside of our understanding at times - if only we would have eyes to see it!

And so this passage, I believe, gives us several things to reflect upon. Where is God at work in the world around us? Do we have eyes to see it? Do we have the courage to join him there? God can and does work through the Church, but when the church ceases to be at work in the world God will find other ways! I pray that we would have eyes to see where God is at work that we might join him there. Too often we make our plans and ask him to bless them. Let's join him in what he is already doing around us.

There's a lesson here about barriers too, I think. This was the day when barriers came down in the Church. Something that once limited the participation in worship of certain people groups was taken down and the message that has been clear all the way through the Gospel narrative became a reality - All are welcome! (remember that?). What barriers do we have in our lives and in our church that may seek to restrict others from worshipping God fully? Are there individuals or people groups that we have called unclean or impure when God is reminding us today that no human is unclean because of who they are, their skin colour, their language or accent, the clothes that they wear, the money that they have or don't have or anything in their past. Who are the 'impure' groups in our society that the church must go and bring in because of the truth of this passage?

Let's make no mistake - this is a challenging calling on the Church. As we read the book of Acts in its entirety we see that much persecution followed those who were courageous enough to take a stand for the message that 'All are Welcome.' But there is a central message here that empowers us for such a mission, I believe. And this central message contains a vital truth that if we are not careful we can miss depending on where we place ourselves in the story. You see it can be tempting to read this story from an insider perspective- and maybe I've been guilty of that when I've called us to reflect on barriers and such things. But the trap we can fall into when we ask questions of this text like 'well who is in and who is out' is that we make the incorrect assumption that our starting point was one of inclusion. It wasn't.

In fact, if we are going to take one thing from this text today it should be this: There was a time when you and I, because of who we are, or because of who we weren't more accurately, were considered outsiders, impure, unclean. And it was down to God himself, who initiated the events of this game changing moment in the history of our faith story, that it has been made clear that no matter our past, our skin colour, our accent or language that we too are to be welcomed in to this beautiful covenant community known as the church and welcomed into the very presence of God. And the only way that we can fully know if that truth has really landed in our hearts is that we live it out so that others are welcomed into that same message.
