# **Pandemic Times**

"Is your love declared in the grave, your faithfulness in Destruction? Are your wonders known in the place of darkness, or your righteous deeds in the land of oblivion?" Psalm 88:11-12

I came to a stunning revelation about these verses this week. They are from Psalm 88 which is often described as the darkest of all Psalms. In it, the Psalmist laments his circumstances with graphic language painting a picture of deep despair. In these verses he asks rhetorical questions of God about the purpose of his suffering – can God's glory be displayed when things are this bad? Surely not!

However, in Christ, God's love has been declared in the grave! He showed faithfulness in the face of destruction! His wonders are known even in the pits of Hell — a statement we declare with the early church as part of the Apostles Creed: "He descended into Hell..."

Even in the deepest pit of suffering, God's love is to be found. No matter where you find yourself in these days, make no mistake, God can and does work in us no matter how difficult things may look. Hallelujah!

Our sermon today continues our theme looking at the work of the Holy Spirit and we are reflecting on the character of Christ which is grown in us as Christians – a stunning reality!

Please continue to pray for our community pop-up café which launches this week. Thank you so much to those of you who have volunteered to help. Also to you who have volunteered to bake. We are hoping that as a church we can be a place of welcome and blessing to the local community through it.

Holy Spirit Encounters (6)

Galatians 5: 13-26

The Fruit of the Spirit

27 June 2021

As we continue on in our journey looking at encounters with the Holy Spirit in the Scriptures and seeking to answer these questions, 'who is the Holy Spirit and what does he do?' let me remind you what we have learned so far. We have learned that the Holy Spirit is part of the Godhead. The Holy Spirit is God. The Holy Spirit is God at work in us, the Church and in the World. We have also learned that the Holy Spirit illuminates Christ in us, leads us into all truth and sends us out empowered on the mission of God. Lucy did a great job last week emphasising particularly that last one as she shared with us from Acts 13 where we saw how both Paul and Barnabus were sent by the spirit all around the known world at the time.

We come today to the book of Galatians where we find some very important teaching on the work of the Holy Spirt at work in us, the people of God. Paul is addressing a group of Christians who seem to have lost their way in their understanding of what it means to be a Christian. What does it look like in someone's life? And Paul says that the mark of being a Christian is that we are filled with the Holy Spirit. You cannot be a Christian without the Holy Spirit.

But what does that even look like? Well it's in answering this questions that Paul gives some of his most famous teaching on the work of the Holy Spirit. He said if you want to know if the Spirit of God is at work in you then you need to look for the fruit. The Holy Spirit produces in us the character of Christ – that is what the fruit is. The fruit is the evidence, if you like, that the Spirit of God is at work in our lives. So here is what those fruit are:

Love: Love is the chief of all the fruit of the Spirit. We'll see next week when we come to look at the gifts of the Spirit that if we don't have love then we are nothing. Earlier in the book of Galatians Paul says this: The only thing that counts is faith expressing itself through love (Gal 5:6). Love is the main evidence that we are living in Christ, you could say.

Joy: The best way I understand joy is to remind myself that joy and happiness are not the same. Happiness is fleeting. Happiness is a response to our happenings. Whereas Joy is much deeper than happiness. Joy is the deep understanding that no matter what is going on we are secure in Christ. This is why Paul can pen words like 'rejoice in the Lord always' (Phil 4:4) even when he is chained to a prison wall!

Peace: The Jewish understanding of peace comes from the Hebrew word shalom which is fuller than how we might understand peace: the absence of disturbance. Shalom is more to do with a feeling of fulfilment which comes again from our understanding of who we are and what we are in Christ.

#### Sermon notes continued...

Patience: A lady in my old church used to tell me that the most dangerous thing we can ever pray for is patience since God doesn't tend to give us patience but circumstances through which patience can be fostered!

Kindness: Kindness is not an optional extra in the Christianity. If the Church should be known for anything then surely it should be kindness. Sadly, this hasn't always been the case!

Goodness: A basic statement of faith is the expression that 'God is good! All the time, God is good!' If we truly believe that then this fundamental character of God will come to fruition in our lives through the work of the Holy Spirit.

Faithfulness: Faithfulness, I like to think of, is the ability to maintain who we are and what we do out of that no matter how hard it gets. It can be so tempting at times to give up. There are times when we can be tempted to do things by way of the world. The ultimate picture of faithfulness is found in Christ who died for us whilst we were still sinners

Self-control: before naming the fruits of the Spirit Paul list the acts of the flesh. The Spirit of God at work in us gives us real power to overcome these destructive things. And it's when we step into that place of self-control we really know what Paul talks about at the start of chapter 5 – Freedom!

I often find that the fruits of the spirit allow for excellent self-reflection. If we really want to know where we are in our faith then ask ourselves this question: can I see growth in my life in these different characteristics over the last weeks, months, years? If not, why not? And if you really want an accurate answer, ask someone who knows you well. I've found that others are often better placed than we are to see where God is at work in us.




