"Remain in me, as I also remain in you. No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me." – John 15:4.

You'll see from the verse above that the theme from last week's sermon has lingered in my mind somewhat. I suppose I could have given dozens of sermons (maybe not all at once!) on the glorious topic that is the fruits of the Spirit and the character of God coming to being in our own lives through the work of the Holy Spirit. Here we are reminded that this language was employed by Christ himself as he shared it with his disciples on the night he was betrayed. His command seems simple: remain in him and the fruit will come. More of a challenge, we know, when one endeavours to live it out every day. But, as is often the case in Scripture, the command is coupled with a promise. As we seek to remain in Christ, through prayer, worship and fellowship in the Church, he comforts us with the fact that he will remain in us! It does not all rely on our own efforts. I don't know about you, but this truth makes me want to exclaim, Hallelujah!

Holy Spirit Encounters (7)

1 Corinthians 12:27 – 14:1a

The Gifts of the Spirit

I wonder if you had part of that Scripture passage read out at your wedding? We did. It's beautiful, isn't it? But as beautiful as it is when it is read aloud at weddings as a description of love between a husband and a wife, it was not written with marriage in mind. It was written as part of teaching on the power and the gifts of the Holy Spirit.

And so for the final time then, and with being in danger of becoming very repetitive – repetition does lead to retention, after all – we have been on a journey through Scripture, haven't we? A journey which has had us asking ourselves this question: who is the Holy Spirit, and what does he do?

And here is what we have learnt so far. The Holy Spirit is God. The Holy Spirit illuminates Christ in our lives. And the Holy Spirit empowers us for the mission of God. I reckon everything we have learnt thus far falls nicely into those categories. And for our final sermon as part of this series we are going to be looking at one of the more challenging aspects of the work of the Holy Spirit. The Spiritual Gifts.

John Wimber was a famous pastor and church leader whose teaching on the gifts of the Spirit remain some of the most influential teaching in the modern church still to this day. Churches that are connected to the movement started by John Wimber, a movement known as the Charismatic Movement, remain among the fastest growing churches in all the world.

And so what is it about Wimber's teaching that was so influential? Well John Wimber was irritated by the fact that when he read the Scriptures, and particularly the New Testament, and compared it to the reality of his Christian experience there was something of a gap. He lamented the fact that as he read the Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles and the teachings of Paul where he heard of miracles and healing and divine intervention and God empowered conversions those encounters didn't appear to be a day to day reality in the way they were portrayed to be in the Scriptures. And so John Wimber dared to ask the question: is this power of God which was available to the Apostles and the Early Chruch still a possibility in the Church today? And he dared to believe that it is. He dared to believe that God's power, his miraculous power, remains available to the believer and one of the ways it manifests itself is through the gifts of the Holy Spirt. Otherwise, he would say, we are merely building a church on human effort.

But, it's also important to note that this conversation on God's power, and specifically the gifts of the Holy Spirit, is one of the most controversial and divisive topics in the church today. Churches have literally split over this topic so we need to exercise wisdom here. And so how do we avoid that same pitfall? How do we maintain a position that seeks to believe that God's power remains available to us whilst at the same time

avoiding the controversy and the mess that it comes with. Well, part of the answer, I think, is found as we turn to Scripture and we ask the Holy Spirit to lead us into all truth. Some of the best teaching you will find on the gifts of the Holy Spirit is to be found in 1 Corinthians chapters 12-14 where the Apostle Paul dedicates 3 whole chapters on the topic. That's where our Scripture text came from today.

And from those 3 chapters we can pull 3 truths regarding the gifts the power of God displayed through the gifts of the Holy Spirit:

The first gift the Spirit gives to every believer is that of faith in Jesus.

"Therefore I want you to understand that no one speaking by the Spirit of God ever says "Let Jesus be cursed!" and no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except by the Holy Spirit." (1 Corinthians 12:3)

Again this reminds us of our already established truth that the Holy Spirit illuminates Christ in our life. Paul here claims that one can't even make the statement, "Jesus is Lord" without the power of the Holy Spirit. And similarly, one can't make claims counter to who Christ is and be filled with the Holy Spirit.

And so if we ever find ourselves at odds with a brother or sister in Christ about anything really, but specifically this challenging topic of the Holy Spirit then it is good practice to bring ourselves back to our unity in Christ-and seek again to find a way forward from there.

Speaking of unity...

The gifts of the Spirit emphasise and celebrate both the diversity and unity in the Church and only always work for the building up of the Church.

"Therefore I want you to know that no one who is speaking by the Spirit of God says, "Jesus be cursed," and no one can say, "Jesus is Lord," except by the Holy Spirit." (1 Corinthians 14:12)

How ironic is it, then, that this topic has caused so much fallout in the church when Paul reminds us here that the gifts of the Spirit only ever work for the building up of the church in unity?

This protects us against any kind of Spiritual abuse that has taken place in the name of Christ or claimed to have been said in the Spirit. Paul says if God has gifted the power of prophecy or miracles or healing then their working should bring about the encouragement of someone and result ultimately in unity in the Church. Anything counter to these things is not done in the power of the Spirit.

The gifts of the Spirit should always, always be tempered with love.

"If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing." (1 Corinthians 13:1-3)

This is where Paul points us back to the character of God. We are reminded here that no power of God can be found where it does not reflect who God is at his very heart – a God of love.

We will share in communion in a few moments time where I believe this is all captured far more effectively but before we do I think that as we draw this series to a close it would be remiss of us if we didn't take some time to seek God's power for the building up of the church.
